

He aha kei roto i te hahau? What does chemotherapy involve?

A guide for bowel cancer patients and their whānau.



At a glance...

- Chemotherapy medications either kill cancer cells or stop them from growing.
- Immunotherapy targets specific cancer cells by using parts of our immune system to destroy cancer cells.
- Several chemotherapy drugs for early-stage and metastatic bowel cancer treatment are fully funded in New Zealand.

How does chemotherapy work?

Systemic anticancer therapy is when chemotherapy drugs travel through the bloodstream to reach cells throughout the body and are given by mouth or injection. Regional chemotherapy is when treatment with anticancer drugs is directed to a specific area of the body.

A number of medicines are used in New Zealand to treat both early-stage and metastatic bowel cancer, and many of these are publicly funded by the government funding agency PHARMAC. These include 5-FU, Capecitabine, Irinotecan and Oxaliplatin.

What are immune and targeted therapies?

A targeted therapy is a drug aimed at a particular gene or protein change in a cancer. An immune therapy (also known as immunotherapy) is designed to prime the immune system to recognise or kill cancer cells. These therapies can help treat metastatic bowel cancer, and new treatments are being developed, tested, and released every year.

Funding: Immune and targeted treatments are not publicly funded for bowel cancer in New Zealand at the moment. However, they are available through cost-capped drug payment plans with pharmaceutical companies.
