How you might feel

Being diagnosed with bowel cancer can come as a real shock, and it's normal to feel upset, anxious, sad, frightened or even a bit numb. Everyone reacts differently – and these feelings can come and go - so it can help to talk about it with family and friends. Take your time to make decisions

It's your body, so don't be pressured into making decisions about your treatment and care in a rush. Before every appointment, make a list of questions to ask your doctors – and don't worry, no question is wrong. The terminology of cancer can be confusing,

The next steps

After diagnosis, the next step is assessment (known as 'staging'). Further tests will be carried out to check the extent of the cancer and whether it has spread to other parts of your body. This might include blood tests, X-ray, CT scan, MRI scan, PET scan or ultrasound – your specialist will explain these tests and why you need them.

Once testing is complete, you'll be given a 'prognosis', which predicts the likely development of the disease and your expected recovery. Your specialist will also outline your treatment options (see 'treatment options' quide sheet).
